Convention Report: Our chapter sent four members: President T.J. Robinson, delegate-at-large (Parliamentarian) and three delegates: Shirley Newman (Time & Place), Byron Nichols (Resolutions) and LaVerne Robinson (Time & Place). After committee meetings were held, there was a round table discussion with presentations by various federal and state chairs. Since the death of National Treasurer Charles W. Saylor on March 3, Richard Thissen, the Region 5 VP assumed the position on April 3. The state Federation president for the previous year, Carol Ek, assumed the Region 5 VP position on April 15. A new state president will be elected in the convention.

Some interesting statistics mentioned in the presentation of the Alzheimer's Chair: Alzheimer's is now the 6th leading cause of death in the nation, but

it only gets \$480 million in federal funding (far less than cancer, HIV/AIDS, etc.). The \$9 million goal for donations by NARFE was met in January, and a new goal of \$10 million by the end of 2012 was set. NARFE is the #1 contributor to Alzheimer's Research of all organizations nationally, and NARFE's money alone has funded nine full-time researchers.

The Live Auction Sunday night netted a total of \$1,365.50. Some of the large-bid items: \$100 for a 3-foot diameter grapevine & strawflower wreath; \$140 for a basket containing wine, glasses, foodstuff and an overnight stay at a Ramada; \$150 for a king-size quilt with pillow and framed picture; and \$150 for a famous P.O. Box bank (about 8" x 12") from John Lancaster.

Monday morning's session started with presentations by various dignitaries, Federation officers and committees. There were only one nomination for each of the Federation offices, and were elected by acclamation:

2 nd VP	Ann Murphy (new, Manhattan Chap.)
Secretary	Louise Lloyd (incumbent)
Treasurer	Jerry Ketter (incumbent)

The afternoon session started with the Memorial Service. Our chapter had 13 deaths in the past year and nationally there were 176 deaths reported.

Next, the Bylaws and Resolutions committee reported on the items passed for consideration by the whole convention from their Sunday meeting:

1) Reduce the per-capita tax back to \$1 from the current \$1.50 – after discussion, a vote to table the resolution until next year failed by a tie vote of 54 to 54. A vote to accept the resolution failed by 36 yea and 76 nay.

2) Change the method of voting to change the per-capita tax from voice vote to paper ballot in order to give chapters with proxy votes a voice. This was approved with greater than 2/3 vote.

3) Change the seating at the national convention to allow visitors, alternates and helpers to sit with the delegates on the floor instead of in the back of the auditorium. This was adopted with nearly unanimous vote (sent to the national office for their consideration).

The members then broke into groups to elect Area VPs. Our area (1A) reelected Judy Etter. All other areas except Area 6 reelected their incumbents.

The National Legislative Chair then presented a report with some bad news: of the various proposals (most just speculation at this point) one would change our COLAs by using different indexes, making them smaller or nonexistent. Let's hope this doesn't happen.

At the Monday night Banquet, the state Federa-

tion officers were installed. Also, entertainment was provided by Harold Williams, singing old standard cowboy songs, many related to the famous trails in the state.

Tuesday's morning session saw the final reports from various committees, including Alzheimer's and PAC, as well as the Federation ticket drawing.

NARFE-PAC collected about \$1600 during the convention.

The Alzheimer's silent auction brought in \$2,710 (preliminary total), about \$700 over last year, for a grand total with the live auction of \$4,075. Next year's per-member goal for contributions has been set at \$5.50, the same as this year. As usual, many smaller chapters whose meeting attendance is higher than the large metro chapters contributed substantially more per member than the goal. Our chapter managed a feeble \$1.60 per member.

No one from our chapter won the Federation drawing for \$50, \$100 or \$250, but it took in more than twice the prize cost, for a \$418 profit. This is used for operating expenses of the Federation.

The Time & Place Committee reported on future sites for the convention. 2014 will be hosted by Chapter 1160 in Shawnee Mission. 2013 will be hosted by Chapter 280 in a Ramada Inn in Salina, from April 28 to 30.

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Legislative, Financial and Health News (summarized from FEDWeek & GEMS Bulletins and NARFE Legislative Hotlines):

Congress: On April 14, the House passed a spending plan appropriating funds for the balance of the current fiscal year ending September 30. It passed the House with a bipartisan vote of 260-167. It then passed the Senate by an overwhelming vote of 81-19. As of writing, it awaited the President's signature.

On April 15, the House passed a budget resolution for fiscal year 2012, starting October 1, 2011, and sent it to the Senate. The measure, authored by Budget Committee Chairman Paul Ryan (R-WI), passed the House by 253-193 on nearly a party line vote. Four other competing plans were considered and defeated. The bill would supposedly reduce spending by \$4.4 trillion over 10 years. \$375 billion of these 10-year savings would come from current and retired federal employees. The cuts include: 1) Require FERS & CSRS covered employees to contribute substantially more to their retirement (despite the fact that the retirement fund is mostly fully funded); 2) Freezing federal pay for **five** years; 3)

Reducing the federal workforce by 10% over three years by various means; 4) Create a voucher system for the Federal Health Benefits Program (FEHBP) in which we would pay a higher percentage of the premiums each year (possibly to the point where some would no longer afford their health insurance).

Both the House and Senate have recessed for Easter and Passover. Most members will return to their districts until May 2nd. This would be the perfect time to visit your congressional delegation and tell them face-to-face that federal employees and retirees reject being used as budget scapegoats. Also use the information at www.ProtectAmericasHeartbeat.org campaign to defend the benefits long earned by federal service.

NARFE has immediately responded to proposed legislation (S.644) introduced by Sen. Richard Burr (R-NC) to eliminate the defined annuity under FERS for employees hired after 2012 (leaving only Social Security). The problem is, under current law, if there is no FERS annuity, there will be no FERS survivor benefits. Also, future retirees and survivors would not be eligible to participate in the FEHBP. The bill hasn't advanced yet.

Another fiscal issue on the horizon is the government will hit its borrowing limit sometime about the end of May, which will start talks of a shutdown again. The Treasury does have several financial maneuvers to temporarily ward off hitting the limit, including borrowing from either the TSP government securities fund or the federal retirement fund, or both. In the past, employees have strongly objected to such steps, in particular the "disinvesting" the G-fund assets, which are investors' **personal property**, so that the government has use of the money and the fund **does not earn interest**. However, the administration recently signaled in its budget proposal that it is willing to use such maneuvers. When these maneuvers were used in the past, investors were paid the accrued interest retroactively (although maybe not all of it – and don't count on it happening this time).

Legislation introduced in March in the House (HR-828) would require the firing of federal employees with seriously delinquent federal tax debt, and would also bar the government from hiring anyone in that status or issuing a contract or grant to such persons. Sponsor Rep. Jason Chaffetz (R-UT) cited IRS figures showing nearly 100,000 federal employees were delinquent on their federal taxes in 2009 (to varying degrees), and owed a total just above \$1 billion, an amount which has increased by \$400 million since 2004. The measure would not affect employees making installment payments on their debt. The proposal has been included in various forms in previously failed proposals.

TSP Funds: The TSPs target-date 2050 life-cycle fund finished its inaugural month with a 3.28%

gain, as all the TSP funds posted positive returns during February. The small company 'S' fund gained 4.52% and the large company 'C' fund was up 3.42%. The international stock 'I' fund returned 3.33%, the bond 'F' fund rose 0.26% and the government securities 'F' fund gained 0.22%. The returns on the other lifecycle funds were: income, 0.9%; 2020 2.15%; 2030 2.6%; and 2040 2.95%.

Consumer Index: For the third consecutive month consumer prices increased more than expected, mostly due to food and fuel. The March CPI-W rose 1.1%, or 2.1% above the 2008 3rd quarter average which our freezes were based upon. If the proposed extensions to the freezes are passed, we will be losing money big-time soon.

Note to members: Dues Withholding saves the national organization money (no bills to mail out) and it saves you about \$4.40 over annually paid dues (\$30.60 national plus chapter vs. \$35.00). You don't have to remember to write that check or risk being dropped. **64%** of our members required to pay dues are already using withholding, why not you? Applications are on the NARFE website at: www.narfe.org.

Reminder: Please send us your **"Best Choice"** UPC codes when you get a bunch! (It's not worth using 44¢ to mail one or two!) We get \$30 per 1000 codes (3¢ per code), plus an additional \$30 bonus once a year. The money goes to Alzheimer's Research. Send them either via a member you know who goes to the meetings or to the address in the return address block. Remember, we need only the bar codes, not the whole label. Saves postage \$.
